Your Directors have pleasure in presenting the 20th Annual Report of Axis Securities Limited (the Company) along with the Audited Financial Statements for the financial year ended March 31, 2026 (hereinafter referred to as the "year under review" or "FY 2025-26").

FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE:-

During the year, the Company achieved a total income of Rs. 1513.60 crores. *(including discontinued operation)*

NATURE OF BUSINESS:

During the year under review, the Company has not changed its nature of business and it remained the same.

BUSINESS OVERVIEW & REVIEW OF OPERATIONS:-

In Financial Year 2025-26, the Company has achieved overall revenue of Rs. 1513.60 crore which is decrease of 8.70% as compared to Rs. 1,657.73 crore in Financial Year 2024-25. The Company has added 7.22 lakhs accounts in FY26 as compared to 8.12 lakhs in FY25.

DIVIDEND:

In order to conserve the resources of your Company, the Directors do not recommend any dividend for the financial year ended March 31, 2026.

GENERAL RESERVE:

During FY 2025-26, the Company has not made any transfer to reserves, except for transfers arising on account of reclassification of cumulative amounts recognized in deemed equity relating to ESOPs, to the extent of options exercised and lapsed.

MATERIAL CHANGE AND COMMITMENT:-

In terms of the information required under sub-section (3)(l) of Section 134 of the Act, it is to be noted that no material changes and commitments, affecting the financial position of the Company has occurred between the end of the Financial Year of the Company to which the Financial Statements relate and to the date of the Directors Report.

SUBSIDIARY COMPANIES, JOINT VENTURE OR ASSOCIATE COMPANIES:

The Company is wholly owned subsidiary of Axis Bank Limited. Further, during the year under review, there were no Companies which have become/ceased to become a Subsidiary/Joint Ventures/ Associate Companies.

DETAILS OF SIGNIFICANT AND MATERIAL ORDERS PASSED BY THE REGULATORS OR COURTS OR TRIBUNALS IMPACTING THE GOING CONCERN STATUS AND COMPANY'S OPERATIONS IN FUTURE:

In terms of the information required under Section – 134 of the Act and Clause – 8 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 it is to be noted that there is no significant and material order passed by the Regulators or Courts or Tribunals impacting the going concern status and Company's operations in future.

STATEMENT INDICATING DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF A RISK MANAGEMENT POLICY INCLUDING IDENTIFICATION THEREIN OF ELEMENTS OF RISK:

Risk Management is a key function in a Stock Broking Company. Real-time monitoring of overall exposure of the Company is required from the point of view of Risk Control. In volatile markets, robust Risk Management policies are must.

The Company has adopted a comprehensive Risk Management Policy identifying various elements of risks, risk parameters and risk containment measures. The Company has automated risk management systems in place. The risk system monitors various trades and positions of the clients on real-time basis with the help of real time data feeds from Exchanges. The system also generates alerts in case of specified events based on the set parameters. A dedicated risk team monitoring the risk systems acts promptly on such alerts. The above risk processes have been put in place for Equities, Derivatives, Commodities and Currencies etc. Risk team also carries out periodic stress test to ascertain the potential loss that may occur in case of an extreme market movement.

Client defaults in paying up the losses arising out of client positions poses significant risk, which in the opinion of the Board may threaten the existence of the Company. Other identified risks are system malfunction, black swan event, Internal as well as external frauds, adverse regulatory action against the Company etc.

INTERNAL CONTROL SYSTEMS AND THEIR ADEQUACY:-

The Company has an Internal Control System commensurate with the size, scale and complexity of its operations. Internal control systems comprising of policies and procedures are designed to ensure reliability of financial reporting, timely feedback on achievement of operational and strategic goals, compliance with policies, procedure, applicable laws and regulations and that all assets and resources are acquired economically, used efficiently and protected adequately.

The Internal Audit and Inspection Department monitors and evaluates the efficacy and adequacy of internal control system in the Company, its compliance with operating systems, accounting procedures and policies at all locations of the Company. Based on the report of internal audit function, process owners undertake corrective action in their respective areas and thereby strengthen the controls. Significant audit observations and corrective actions thereon are presented to the Audit Committee of the Board. A yearly presentation on Internal Financial Control Systems is also presented to Audit Committee of the Board.

VIGIL MECHANISM / WHISTLE BLOWER POLICY:-

The Company has adopted the code of conduct for employee, customers, vendors and also for its Directors for the highest degree of transparency, integrity, accountability and corporate social responsibility. Any actual or potential violation of the Code would be a matter of serious concern for the Company.

In compliance with the provisions of Section 177(9) of the Act read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Meetings of Board and its Powers) Rules, 2014, the Company has also put in place, a Whistle

Blower policy which enables employees to report about actual or potential illegal and/or unacceptable practices. The policy is designed to enable employees, to raise concerns to Whistleblower Committee, without revealing his/her identity, if he/she chooses to do so and to disclose information which the individual believes, shows malpractice or wrongdoing which could affect the business or reputation of the Company.

The Policy is to provide framework for an effective vigil mechanism and to provide protection to employees, customers, vendors or directors reporting genuine concerns.

Employees of the Company are encouraged to use guidance provided in the Policy for reporting all allegations of suspected improper activities to the Whistle Blower Committee by sending the members an email on whistleblower@axissecurities.in

The whistleblower complaints received in FY2025-26 were reviewed by the Audit Committee on a quarterly basis. During the financial year under review, the Company received two complaints, which were considered and reported to the Whistle Blower Committee. Following a detailed investigation, the two complaints were found to be not proven and closed. The same information was reported to the Chairman of the Audit Committee.

The Shareholders of the Company at the 17th Annual General Meeting of the Company held on June 22, 2023, approved the appointment of M/s. Singhi & Co. LLP, Chartered Accountants (FRN: 302049E) as the Statutory Auditors of the Company for a period of 5 years and will continue to act as Statutory Auditors for the FY 2026-27.

The observation(s) made in the Auditor's Report are self-explanatory and therefore, do not call for any further comments under Section 134(3)(f) of the Act.

The Statutory Auditors Report for FY 2025-26 does not contain any qualifications, reservations, or adverse remarks, or disclaimers. The Statutory Auditors have not reported any incident of fraud to the Audit Committee or the Board of Directors under Section 143(12) of the Act, during the year under review.

ii. Secretarial Auditors and their Report:

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 204 of the Companies Act, 2013 and the Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, the Company has appointed M/s. Alwyn Jay & Co., Practicing Company Secretaries (FCS:5559/COP No. 5137), to undertake the Secretarial Audit of the Company for the financial year under review. The Secretarial Audit Report in Form MR-3 for the FY 2025-26 is annexed herewith as **Annexure –E**.

The Secretarial Audit report for FY 2025-26 does not contain any qualifications, reservations or adverse remarks or disclaimers.

During the year under review, there was no fraud reported by the Secretarial Auditor to the Audit Committee or the Board of Directors under section 143(12) of the Act.

- iii. To also identify and recognize accountability, transparency and equality of treatment for all stakeholders, as central tenets of good corporate governance.

PROSPECTS AND OUTLOOK FOR THE FUTURE

Indian Equity Markets – FY 2025–26 Overview

FY 2025-26 was a year of two distinct halves. Markets spent the first six months consolidating after the sharp rally of the prior fiscal, with valuations normalising against a backdrop of rising global uncertainties. Investor sentiment reflected this caution, shaped by US tariff developments, elevated global bond yields, a stronger dollar, sustained FPI outflows, and ongoing geopolitical tensions across the Middle East and key trade corridors.

The second half brought greater stability. Domestic liquidity improved, and policy support strengthened. The RBI delivered a 25 bps repo rate cut in December 2025 alongside a cumulative 100 bps CRR reduction phased through the year. Consumption-oriented reforms under GST 2.0 and a capex-led Union Budget for FY 2026-27 helped restore investor confidence. The RBI's macroeconomic outlook remained constructive, with FY26 GDP growth projected at 7.4% and inflation within target. The conclusion of the India-US trade agreement, which reduced tariffs from 50% to 18%, added a structurally positive dimension to India's external stability and medium-term growth narrative. The Nifty touched an all-time high of 26,358 on 5 January 2026.

Corporate earnings mirrored this two-phase dynamic. After a subdued prior fiscal, profitability began recovering in H1 FY26 and gained meaningful momentum through Q3, with mid and small-cap companies delivering stronger earnings growth than Nifty 50 constituents.

The final quarter, however, brought renewed turbulence. A sharp correction in March 2026 saw the Nifty decline over 11%, driven by escalating Middle East tensions, crude oil prices breaching the USD 100-110/bbl range, persistent FII outflows, and a broader risk-off environment. For the full year, the Nifty 50 ended down 5.3%, the Nifty Midcap 100 gained 1.9%, and the Nifty Smallcap 250 fell 5.4%, reflecting a wide divergence across market segments.

Retail Broking Industry

The retail broking industry saw a moderation in growth after the exceptional participation surge of FY25. New demat account additions slowed, though underlying investor engagement remained structurally intact, underpinned by the continuing financialisation of household savings. SEBI's regulatory interventions in the derivatives segment, while moderating near-term volumes, are expected to strengthen the long-term integrity and sustainability of Indian capital markets.

Primary market activity remained healthy, albeit more evenly distributed through the year. FY26 set a new record for mainboard IPO fundraising, with 112 companies raising Rs. 1.79 lakh crore, surpassing the 78 companies and Rs. 1.62 lakh crore raised in FY25. Market reception, however, was more discerning: approximately 66% of FY26 IPOs traded below their issue price, reflecting a meaningful reset in listing expectations.

Outlook -FY26-27

India's structural growth story remains intact. Resilient domestic demand, policy continuity, and corporate balance sheets that are largely deleveraged provide a solid foundation. Government-led capital expenditure, improving private sector participation, and a steady consumption environment continue to underpin India's growth visibility relative to most global peers.

The principal near-term risk is crude oil. With India importing approximately 85% of its crude requirements, a sustained price above USD 100 per barrel would translate into elevated inflation, currency pressure, and a widening current account deficit, constraining monetary policy flexibility and weighing on corporate margins. This remains the key overhang on FY27 earnings estimates.

At current levels, Nifty 50 forward valuations are close to long-term historical averages at approximately 18x FY27 earnings. The outlook for FY27 is therefore contingent on how quickly geopolitical tensions ease and whether crude prices moderate from current levels. An earlier-than-expected de-escalation would meaningfully improve the growth trajectory. Until then, near-term conditions are likely to remain selective, with market performance driven by earnings delivery rather than valuation re-rating.

SECRETARIAL STANDARDS:-

During the year under review, the Company has complied with the all the applicable Secretarial Standard issued by Institute of Company Secretaries of India.

- During the year with respect to the adequacy of the internal financial controls with reference to financial statements of the Company and the operating effectiveness of such controls, refer to our separate Report in Independent Auditors' Report.
- During the year, there were no instances of one-time settlements with any banks or financial institutions during the year. As a result, there is no difference between the valuation amount at the time of one-time settlement and the valuation amount when taking out loans from these entities.

TRANSFER OF AMOUNTS TO INVESTOR EDUCATION AND PROTECTION FUND:-

The Company did not have any funds specified under section 125 of the Companies Act, 2013, lying unpaid or unclaimed. Accordingly, there were no funds that were required to be transferred to the Investor Education and Protection Fund (IEPF).

DETAILS OF SIGNIFICANT AND MATERIAL ORDERS PASSED BY THE REGULATORS OR COURTS OR TRIBUNALS IMPACTING THE GOING CONCERN STATUS AND COMPANY'S OPERATIONS IN FUTURE OPERATIONS:

There is no significant material orders passed by the regulators or courts or tribunals impacting the going concern status and company's operations in future operations.

DETAILS OF DISCOUNTED OPERATIONS- PMS BUSINESS

The Board of Directors of the Company, at its meeting held on 10th October 2025, approved the business transfer agreement of the Company's Portfolio Management Services (PMS) business as a going concern, on a slump sale basis for a lump-sum consideration, pursuant to a Business Transfer Agreement executed on 4th December 2025 with a fellow subsidiary. The said transfer has also been approved by the shareholders of the Company at the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 1st December, 2025.

The completion of the transaction is subject to receipt of requisite regulatory approvals, In this regard, the Company has received approval from the Competition Commission of India (CCI);

however, the approval from the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) is awaited as at the reporting date. Based on management's assessment that the disposal of the PMS business is highly probable, the said business has been classified as a disposal group held for sale and presented as a discontinued operation in accordance with Ind AS 105 "Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations".

Accordingly, the results of the PMS business have been presented separately as discontinued operations and related assets and liabilities related to the PMS business have been classified as held for sale. The figures for the previous period have been re-stated to give effect, wherever applicable, to conform to the presentation requirements of Ind AS 105.

Opinion

1. We have audited the accompanying Ind AS Financial Statements ("Financial Statements") of Axis Securities Limited (hereinafter referred as "the Company"), which comprise the Balance sheet as at March 31, 2026, the Statement of Profit and Loss (including Other Comprehensive Income), Statement of Changes in Equity and the Statement of Cash Flows for the year then ended, and notes to the Financial Statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.
2. Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026

1. Corporate Information

Axis Securities Limited ('the Company') is a public company domiciled in India and is incorporated under the provision of Companies Act applicable in India. The Company is engaged in the business of broking, including allied services of extending margin trade finance, distribution of financial products and advisory services. The Company is a depository participant of National Securities Depository Limited (NSDL) and Central Depository Services Limited (CDSL) and is also registered as a portfolio manager with Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI). The Company is registered as a Mutual Fund Advisor with Association of Mutual Funds in India (AMFI) and acts as a corporate agent of various Insurance Companies. The Company is debt listed public limited Company and is a wholly owned subsidiary of Axis Bank Limited (the "Parent"). The registered office address of the Company is Ground Floor, Unit No 002, Piramal Agastya, Kamani Junction, Near Pheonix Market city mall, Kurla West, Mumbai-400070

2. Material Accounting Policies

(i) Basis of preparation

The Company's financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Indian Accounting Standards ('Ind AS') notified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 ("The Act") read with the Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and other relevant provision of the Act, as amended from time to time. Furthermore, the guidance notes/ announcements issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) are also applied.

The financial statements have been prepared and presented on the going concern basis using accrual basis of accounting and under the historical cost convention except for certain assets and liabilities which have been measured at fair value or present value, as the case may be.

The standalone financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI) instruments, other financial assets held for trading and financial assets and liabilities designated at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), defined benefit plan asset/ liability, share based payments, all of which have been measured at fair value.

Accounting policies have been consistently applied except where newly issued accounting standard is adopted during the current year or a revision to an existing accounting standard requires a change in the accounting policy hitherto in use.

The Company's financial statements are presented in Indian Rupees (₹), which is also its functional currency and the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company operates and all values are rounded to the nearest lakhs, except when otherwise indicated.

Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026

The financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026 are being authorised for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Board of Directors passed at their meeting held on April 13, 2026.

(ii) Presentation of the financial statements

The Balance Sheet, The Statement of changes in Equity and the Statement of Profit and loss are presented in the format prescribed under Division III of Schedule III of the Companies Act, as amended from time to time that are required to comply with Ind AS. The statement of Cash flows has been presented as per the requirements of Ind AS 7 "Statement of Cash flows".

An analysis regarding recovery or settlement within 12 months after the reporting date (current) and more than 12 months after the reporting date (non-current) is presented in Note 35.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are generally reported on gross basis in the balance sheet. They are offset and reported net only when, in addition to having an unconditional legally enforceable right to offset the recognised amounts without being contingent on a future event, the parties also intend to settle simultaneously on a net basis in all of the following circumstances:

- a. The normal course of business
- b. The event of default
- c. The event of insolvency or bankruptcy of the Group and/or its counterparties

(iii) Use of Estimates and Judgements

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with Ind AS requires that management make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and the reported amounts of assets, liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities as of the date of the financial statements and the income and expense for the reporting period. The actual results could differ from these estimates. Estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised and in any future periods affected. The Company makes certain judgments and estimates for valuation and impairment of financial instruments, fair valuation of employee stock options, useful life of property, plant and equipment, deferred tax assets, provision and contingencies, leases and defined benefit obligations. Management believes that the estimates used in the preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Changes in estimates are reflected in the financial statements in the period in which changes are made and, if material, their effects are disclosed in the notes to the financial statements. Information about critical judgements in applying accounting policies, as well as estimates and assumptions that have the most significant effect on the amount recognised in the financial statements are included in the following notes.

Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026**(a) Business Model Assessment:**

Classification and measurement of financial assets depends on the results of the SPPI (Solely Payments of Principal and Interest) and the business model test. The Company determines the business model at a level that reflects how groups of financial assets are managed together to achieve a particular business objective. This assessment includes judgement reflecting all relevant evidence including how the performance of the assets is evaluated and their performance measured, the risks that affect the performance of the assets and how these are managed. The Company monitors financial assets measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income that are derecognised prior to their maturity to understand the reason for their disposal and whether the reasons are consistent with the objective of the business for which the asset was held. Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), where the assets are managed in accordance with an approved investment strategy that triggers purchase and sale decisions based on the fair value of such assets. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value, with unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value being recognised in the standalone statement of profit and loss in the period in which they arise.

(b) Provision and contingent liability:

On an ongoing basis, Company reviews pending cases, claims by third parties and other contingencies. For contingent losses that are considered probable, an estimated loss is recorded as an accrual in financial statements. Loss Contingencies that are considered possible are not provided for but disclosed as Contingent liabilities in the financial statements. Contingencies the likelihood of which is remote are not disclosed in the financial statements. Gain contingencies are not recognized until the contingency has been resolved and amounts are received or receivable.

(c) Effective Interest Rate (EIR) Method:

The Company's EIR methodology, recognises interest income / expense using a rate of return that represents the best estimate of a constant rate of return over the expected behavioural life of loans given / taken and recognises the effect of potentially different interest rates at various stages and other characteristics of the financial instruments. This estimation, by nature, requires an element of judgment regarding the expected behaviour and life-cycle of the instruments, as well expected changes to India's base rate and other fee income/ expense that are integral parts of the instrument.

(d) Allowance for impairment of financial asset:

The Company applies expected credit loss model (ECL) for measurement and recognition of impairment loss. The Company recognises lifetime expected losses for all contract assets and / or all trade receivables that do not constitute a financing transaction. At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether the loans have been impaired. The Company is exposed

to credit risk when the customer defaults on his contractual obligations. For the computation of ECL, the loan receivables are classified into three stages based on the default and the aging outstanding. The Company recognises life time expected credit loss for trade receivables and has adopted simplified method of computation as per Ind AS 109. The Company considers outstanding overdue for more than 90 days for calculation of expected credit loss.

(e) Recognition of deferred tax assets:

Deferred tax assets are recognised for unused tax-loss carry forwards and unused tax credits to the extent that realisation of the related tax benefit is probable. The assessment of the probability with regard to the realisation of the tax benefit involves assumptions based on the history of the entity and budgeted data for the future.

(f) Defined benefit plans:

The cost of defined benefit plans and the present value of the defined benefit obligations are based on actuarial valuation using the projected unit credit method. An actuarial valuation involves making various assumptions that may differ from actual developments in the future. These include the determination of the discount rate, future salary increases and mortality rates. Due to the complexities involved in the valuation and its long - term nature, a defined benefit obligation is highly sensitive to changes in these assumptions. All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date.

(g) Share based payment:

The Company account for share based payment by measuring and recognizing as compensation expense the fair value of all share-based payment awards made to employees based on estimated grant date fair values. The determination of fair value involves a number of significant estimates. The Company uses the Black Scholes option pricing model to estimate the value of employee stock options which requires a number of assumptions to determine the model inputs. These include the expected volatility of Company's stock and employee exercise behaviour which are based on historical data as well as expectations of future developments over the term of the option. As stock-based compensation expense is based on awards ultimately expected to vest. Management's estimate of exercise is based on historical experience but actual exercise could differ materially as a result of voluntary employee actions and involuntary actions which would result in significant change in our share based compensation expense amounts in the future.

(h) Property, plant and equipment and Intangible Assets:

Management reviews the estimated useful lives and residual values of the assets annually in order to determine the amount of depreciation to be recorded during any reporting period. The useful lives and residual values as per schedule II of the Companies Act, 2013 or are based on the Company's historical experience with similar assets and taking into account anticipated technological changes, whichever is more appropriate.

The Company evaluates if an arrangement qualifies to be a lease as per IND AS 116.

- The Company determines lease term as a non-cancellable period of a lease, together with both the period covered by an option to extend the lease if the Company is reasonably certain to exercise lessee options.
- The determination of the incremental borrowing rate used to measure lease liabilities.

(iv) Revenue from Contracts with Customers

The Company recognizes revenue from contracts with customers based on a five step model as set out in Ind AS 115, Revenue from Contracts with Customers, to determine when to recognize revenue and at what amount. Revenue is measured based on the consideration specified in the contract with a customer. Revenue from contracts with customers is recognised when services are provided and it is highly probable that a significant reversal of revenue is not expected to occur. Revenue is measured at fair value of the consideration received or receivable. Revenue is recognised when (or as) the Company satisfies a performance obligation by transferring a promised service (i.e. an asset) to a customer. An asset is transferred when (or as) the customer obtains control of that asset. When (or as) a performance obligation is satisfied, the Company recognizes as revenue the amount of the transaction price (excluding estimates of variable consideration) that is allocated to that performance obligation.

The Company applies the five-step approach for recognition of revenue:

- Identification of contract(s) with customers;
- Identification of the separate performance obligations in the contract;
- Determination of transaction price;
- Allocation of transaction price to the separate performance obligations; and
- Recognition of revenue when (or as) each performance obligation is satisfied
- The Company recognises revenue from the following sources:

a) Brokerage Income

Revenue recognition for brokerage fees can be divided into the following two categories:

i) Brokerage fees – point in time

It is recognised on trade date basis in accordance with the terms of contract and is exclusive of goods and service tax and securities transaction tax (STT) wherever applicable.

ii) Brokerage fees – over the time

Fees earned for the provision of services are recognised over time as the customer simultaneously receives and consumes the benefits, as the services are rendered. These include brokerage fees which is fixed at inception irrespective of number of transaction executed. The revenue for such contracts is recognised on consumption of benefits and the balance unutilized plan value is recognised on maturity/ validity of plan. Lifetime subscriptions based revenue are recognised at a point in time and other subscriptions are recognised over period of time based on subscription period.

- b)** Commissions from distribution of financial products are recognised upon allotment of the securities to the applicant.

c) Portfolio management fees

Portfolio management fees are recognised on accrual basis as follows:

- In case of fixed percentage of the corpus/ fixed amount, income is accrued over the period of the agreement.
- In case of fee based on the returns of the portfolio, income is accounted on each anniversary date specified in the portfolio Agreement
- In case of upfront non-refundable fees, income is accounted over a period of time.

The Company charges an early withdrawal fee when investors withdraw their invested funds before a specified period, as per the agreed terms. This fee is recognized as revenue at the time the withdrawal event occurs, as it represents the culmination of the Company's right to receive the fee.

d) Depository fees and Services

Revenue from depository services on account of annual maintenance charges is accounted over the period of performance obligation. Revenue from depository services on account of transaction charges is recognised point in time when the performance obligation is satisfied.

e) Interest income from Margin Trading Funding

Interest earned on Margin trading funding facility provided to the customers is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding from customers and the rates applicable.

Any differences between the fair values of financial instruments classified as fair value through the profit or loss (FVTPL) held by the Company on the balance sheet date is recognized as an unrealized gain / loss under "Net gains/loss on fair value changes" under Revenue from operations in the statement of Profit and Loss.

All realized gains or losses from changes in the fair value of financial assets and financial liabilities at FVTPL is recognized as a realized gain / loss under "Net gains/loss on fair value changes".

g) Dividend Income

Dividend income is recognised when the right to receive payment of the dividend is established, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the dividend will flow to the Company and the amount of the dividend can be measured reliably.

- h)** Research and advisory income is accounted for on an accrual basis in accordance with the terms of the respective agreements entered into between the Company and the counter party.
- i)** Interest is earned on delayed payments from customers and is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding from customers and the rates applicable.
- j)** The Company also distributes insurance products and mutual fund scheme for which it receives commission income. In case the client discontinues the policy or redeem the mutual fund units within the stipulated time, Company is liable to repay the commission.

k) Other Income

In respect of other Income not covered above it is accounted to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow and the revenue can be measured reliably.

(v) Property, plant and equipment and Capital work-in progress**Recognition and measurement:**

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost of acquisition less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Subsequent cost are included in the asset's carrying amount. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition and installation of the assets.

Items of property, plant and equipment are initially recorded at cost.

Cost comprises acquisition cost, borrowing cost if capitalization criteria are met, and directly attributable cost of bringing the asset to its working condition for the intended use. Subsequent

expenditure relating to property, plant and equipment is capitalized only when it is probable that future economic benefit associated with these will flow with the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably.

The assets individually costing up to ₹ 5,000/- are depreciated fully in the year of acquisition.

Items of Property, plant and equipment that have been retired from active use and are held for disposal are stated at the lower of their net book value or net realisable value and are shown separately in the financial statements, if any.

Depreciation:

Depreciation provided on property, plant and equipment is calculated on a straight-line basis using the rates arrived at based on the useful lives estimated by management.

The residual values, estimated useful lives and methods of depreciation of property, plant and equipment are reviewed at the end of each financial year and changes if any, are accounted for on a prospective basis.

Capital work-in-progress and Capital advances:

Capital work-in-progress are property, plant and equipment which are not yet ready for their intended use. At the point when an asset is capable of operating at management's intended

use, the cost of construction is transferred to the appropriate category of property, plant and equipment. Costs associated with the commissioning of an asset are capitalized.

Advances given towards acquisition of a tangible assets outstanding at each reporting date are shown as other non-financial assets.

Depreciation is not recorded on capital work-in-progress until construction and installation is completed and assets are ready for its intended use

De-recognition:

The carrying amount of an item of property, plant and equipment is derecognized on disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Gains or losses arising from de-recognition, disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised net, within "Other Income" or "Other Expenses", as the case maybe, in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the year of de-recognition, disposal or retirement.

(vi) Intangible Assets and Intangible Assets under Development

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less accumulated amortisation and accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost of an intangible asset includes purchase price, non-refundable taxes and duties and any other directly attributable expenditure on making the asset ready for its intended use and net of any trade discounts and rebates.

Development expenditure on software is capitalized as part of the cost of the resulting intangible asset only if the expenditure can be measured reliably, the product or process is technically and commercially feasible, future economic benefits are probable, and the Company intends to and has sufficient resources to complete development and to use or sell the asset. Otherwise it is recognized in the profit or loss as incurred. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is measured at cost less accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated using the straight-line method to write down the cost of intangible assets to their residual values over their estimated useful lives and is included in the depreciation and amortization in the statement of profit and loss. The amortisation period and the amortisation method are reviewed at each reporting date.

Gains or losses arising from de-recognition, disposal or retirement of an item of intangible assets are measured as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and are recognised net, within "Other Income" or "Other Expenses", as the case maybe, in the Statement of Profit and Loss in the year of de-recognition, disposal or retirement.

(vii) Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and financial liability or equity instrument of another entity. Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when Company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instruments.

a) Initial recognition and measurements

Financial assets and liabilities, with the exception of loans, deposits, debt securities and borrowings are initially recognised on the trade date, i.e., the date that the Company becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument. This includes regular way trades, purchases or sales of financial assets that require delivery of assets within the time frame generally established by regulation or convention in the market place (regular way trades) are recognized on the trade date, i.e., the date that the Company commits to purchase or sell the asset. Loans are recognised when funds are transferred to the customers' account. The Company recognises debt securities, deposits and borrowings when funds reach the Company.

The Company recognizes all the financial assets and liabilities at its fair value on initial recognition; In the case of financial assets not valued at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset are added to the fair value on initial recognition.

b) Classification and Subsequent Measurement of Financial Assets

The Company assesses the classification and measurement of a financial asset based on the contractual cash flow characteristics of the asset and the Company's business model for managing the asset. On Initial recognition, a financial asset is classified and measured at:

- Amortized Cost (AC)
- Fair value through profit and loss (FVTPL)

- Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI)

Financial assets are not reclassified subsequent to their initial recognition, except if and in the period, the Company changes its business model for managing financial assets.

Amortised cost: The Company classifies the financial assets at amortised cost if the contractual cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and the assets are held under a business model to collect contractual cash flows. The gains and losses resulting from fluctuations in fair value are not recognised for financial assets classified in amortised cost measurement category.

Fair value through other comprehensive income (FVOCI): The Company classifies the financial assets as FVOCI if the contractual cash flows represent solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding and the Company's business model is achieved by both collecting contractual cash flow and selling financial assets. In case of debt instruments measured at FVOCI, changes in fair value are recognised in other comprehensive income. Other net gains and losses are recognized in other comprehensive income (OCI). The impairment gains or losses, foreign exchange gains or losses and interest calculated using the effective interest method are recognised in profit or loss. On de-recognition, the cumulative gain or loss previously recognised in other comprehensive income is re-classified from equity to profit or loss as a reclassification adjustment. In case of equity instruments irrevocably designated at FVOCI, gains / losses including relating to foreign exchange, are recognised through other comprehensive income. Further, cumulative gains or losses previously recognised in other comprehensive income remain permanently in equity and are not subsequently transferred to profit or loss on de-recognition.

Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL): The financial assets are classified as FVTPL if these do not meet the criteria for classifying at amortised cost or FVOCI. Further, in certain cases to eliminate or significantly reduce a measurement or recognition inconsistency (accounting mismatch), the Company irrevocably designates certain financial instruments at FVTPL at initial recognition. In case of financial assets measured at FVTPL, changes in fair value are recognised in profit or loss. Profit or loss on sale of investments is determined on the basis of first-in-first-out (FIFO) basis. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. The fair value measurement is based on the presumption that the transaction to sell the asset or transfer the liability takes place either:

- In the principal market for the asset or liability, or
- In the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market for the asset or liability.

The principal or the most advantageous market must be accessible by the Company. The fair value of an asset or a liability is measured using the assumptions that market participants

would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming that market participants act in their economic best interest. A fair value measurement of a non-financial asset takes into account a market participant's ability to generate economic benefits by using the asset in its highest and best use or by selling it to another market participant that would use the asset in its highest and best use. In order to show how fair values have been derived, financial instruments are classified based on a hierarchy of valuation techniques, as summarised below:

Level 1 financial instruments: Those where the inputs used in the valuation are unadjusted quoted prices from active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the Company has access to at the measurement date. The Company considers markets as active only if there are sufficient trading activities with regards to the volume and liquidity of the identical assets or liabilities and when there are binding and exercisable price quotes available on the balance sheet date.

Level 2 financial instruments: Those where the inputs that are used for valuation and are significant, are derived from directly or indirectly observable market data available over the entire period of the instrument's life.

Level 3 financial instruments: Those that include one or more unobservable input that is significant to the measurement as whole.

Based on the Company's business model for managing the investments, the Company has classified its investments and securities for trade at FVTPL. Financial liabilities are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method. For trade and other payables, the carrying amount approximates the fair value due to short maturity of these instruments.

c) Classification and Subsequent Measurement of Financial Liabilities and Equity

The Company classifies these instruments as financial liabilities or equity instruments in accordance with substance of the Contractual terms of the Instruments.

Equity:

An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of an entity after deducting all its liabilities. Equity instruments issued by the Company are recognised at the face value and proceeds received more than the face value are recognised as securities premium.

Financial liabilities:

The Company recognizes a financial liability in its Balance Sheet when it becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial liabilities are classified at amortised cost. A financial liability is classified as at FVTPL if it is classified as held for trading, or it is a derivative or it is designated as such on initial recognition. All financial liabilities of the Company are categorized as subsequently measured at amortized cost are subsequently measured using the effective interest method.

All financial liabilities of the Company are categorized at fair value are subsequently measured at fair value through profit and loss statement.

Classification and measurement of financial assets depends on the results of the SPPI (Solely Payments of Principal and Interest) and the business model test. The Company determines the business model at a level that reflects how groups of financial assets are managed together to achieve a particular business objective. This assessment includes judgement reflecting all relevant evidence including how the performance of the assets is evaluated and their performance measured, the risks that affect the performance of the assets and how these are managed. The Company monitors financial assets measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income that are derecognised prior to their maturity to understand the reason for their disposal and whether the reasons are consistent with the objective of the business for which the asset was held. Fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), where the assets are managed in accordance with an approved investment strategy that triggers purchase and sale decisions based on the fair value of such assets. Such assets are subsequently measured at fair value, with unrealised gains and losses arising from changes in the fair value being recognised in the statement of profit and loss in the period in which they arise.

Effective Interest Rate ("EIR") method - The Company's EIR methodology, recognises interest expense using a rate of return that represents the best estimate of a constant rate of return over the expected behavioural life of loans taken and recognises the effect of potentially different interest rates at various stages and other characteristics of the financial instruments. This estimation, by nature, requires an element of judgement regarding the expected behaviour and life-cycle of the instruments, as well as expected changes to India's base rate and other fee income/expense that are integral parts of the instrument.

d) De-recognition**Financial assets**

The Company derecognises a financial asset when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or it transfers the rights to receive the contractual cash flows in a transaction in which substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership of the financial asset are transferred or in which the Company neither transfers nor retains substantially all of the risks and rewards of ownership and does not retain control of the financial asset.

The Company enters into transactions whereby it transfers assets recognised on its balance sheet, but retains either all or substantially all of the risks and rewards of the transferred assets, the transferred assets are not derecognised.

Financial liabilities

The Company derecognises a financial liability when its contractual obligations are discharged or cancelled, or expire.

e) Offsetting

Financial assets and financial liabilities are offset and the net amount presented in the balance sheet when, and only when, the Company currently has a legally enforceable right to set off the amounts and it intends either to settle them on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

f) Impairment of financial assets

In accordance with Ind AS 109, the Company applies expected credit loss model (ECL) for measurement and recognition of impairment loss for the financial assets which are not measured at FVTPL. At each reporting date, the Company assesses whether the financial assets are credit – impaired. The financial asset is 'credit impaired' when one or more events that have a detrimental impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset have occurred. The Company considers that the credit risk on a financial asset has increased significantly if it is more than 90 days past due. A financial asset is written off when there is no reasonable expectation of recovering the Contractual cash flows.

(viii) Employee Benefits**a) Short term Employee Benefits**

Short term employee benefits include salaries and short-term cash bonus. A liability is recognised for the amount expected to be paid under short-term cash bonus or target-based incentives if the Company has a present legal or constrictive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee, and the obligation can be estimated reliably. These costs are recognised as an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid over the period of services rendered by the employees to the Company.

b) Defined Contribution Plan

The Defined contribution plans are the plans in which the Company pays pre-defined amounts to separate funds and does not have any legal or constrictive obligation to pay additional sums.

Retirement benefits in the form of provident fund is a defined contribution scheme. The Company is statutorily required to contribute a specified portion of the basic salary of an employee to a provident fund as part of retirement benefits to its employees. The contributions are charged to the Statement of profit and loss of the year when the contributions to the respective funds are due.

The Company makes contributions towards National Pension Scheme ("NPS") which is a defined contribution retirement benefit plans for employees who have opted for the contribution towards NPS.

The Company also makes contribution towards Employee State Insurance Scheme ("ESIC") which is a contributory scheme providing medical, sickness, maternity, and disability benefits to the insured employees under the Employees State Insurance Act, 1948 in respect of qualifying employees.

c) Defined Benefits Plan

The Company pays gratuity, a defined benefit plan, to its employees whose employment terminates after a minimum period of five years of continuous service on account of retirement or resignation.

The Company's obligation in respect of the gratuity plan, which is a defined benefit plan, is provided for based on actuarial valuation using the projected unit credit method. The gratuity fund is funded. Actuarial gains or losses are recognized in other comprehensive income. These assumptions include salary escalation rate, discount rates, expected rate of return on assets and mortality rates.

d) Share Based Payments Transactions

Axis Bank Limited ("the Parent") grants employee stock options to the eligible employees of the Company. The schemes provide for grant of options to employees of the Group to acquire the equity shares of the Bank that vest in cliff vesting or in a graded manner and that are to be exercised within a specified period. In accordance with, SEBI (Share Based Employee Benefits) Regulations, 2014 and the Guidance Note on "Accounting for Employee Share-based payments" issued by The Institute of Chartered Accountants of India the Bank has started charging share-linked instruments on fair value method instead of intrinsic value for all instruments granted after the accounting period ending March 31, 2021. The fair value of the stock-based compensation is estimated on the date of grant using Black- Scholes model and is charged to the company over the vesting period.

The share of the company's capital contribution reimbursed to the Bank is recorded as an expense in the Statement of Profit and Loss under Share based payments to employees in Employee benefits expenses.

Notes forming part of the financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2026**(ix) Borrowings costs**

Borrowing costs include interest expense as per the effective interest rate (EIR) and other costs incurred by the Company in connection with the borrowing of funds. Borrowing costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of those property, plant & equipment and intangible assets which necessarily take a substantial period of time to get ready for their intended use are capitalized. Other borrowing costs are recognized as an expense in the year in which they are incurred. The difference between the discounted amount mobilized and redemption value of commercial papers is recognized in the statement of profit and loss over the life of the instrument using the EIR.

(x) Foreign Currency Transactions and Translation

The functional currency and the presentation currency of the Company is Indian Rupees. Foreign currency transactions are recorded at the exchange rate prevailing on the date of transaction. Exchange differences arising on settlement of revenue transactions are recognised in the statement of profit and loss. Monetary assets and liabilities contracted in foreign currencies are restated at the rate of exchange ruling at the Balance Sheet date. Non - monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured at historical cost in foreign currency are not retranslated at reporting date.

(xi) Leases**The Company as lessee**

The Company leased assets primarily consist of leases for office premises. The Company assesses at inception whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. That is, if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. The Company applies a single recognition and measurement approach for all leases, except for short-term lease. At the commencement date of the lease, the Company recognises lease liabilities measured at the present value of lease payments to be made over the lease term. In calculating the present value of lease payments, the Company uses its incremental borrowing rate at the lease commencement date because the interest rate implicit in the lease is not readily determinable.

Lease Term

Ind AS 116 – Leases requires lessee to determine the lease term as the non-cancellable period of a lease adjusted with any option to extend or terminate the lease, if the use of such option is reasonably certain. The Company makes assessment on the expected lease term on lease by lease basis and thereby assesses whether it is reasonably certain that any options to extend or terminate the contract will be exercised. In evaluating the lease term, the Company

considers factors such as any significant leasehold improvements undertaken over the lease term, costs relating to the termination of lease and the importance of the underlying to the Company's operations taking into account the location of the underlying asset and the availability of the suitable alternatives. The lease term in future periods is reassessed to ensure that the lease term reflects the current economic circumstances.

Lease Liability

The lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date are discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease. If that rate cannot be readily determined, which is generally the case for leases in the Company, the lessee's incremental borrowing rate is used, being the rate that the individual lessee would have to pay to borrow the funds necessary to obtain an asset of similar value to the right-of-use asset in a similar economic environment with similar terms, security and conditions. The discount rate is generally based on the incremental borrowing rate specific to the lease being evaluated.

The lease liability is presented as a separate line in the Balance Sheet.

The Company re-measures the lease liability (and makes a corresponding adjustment to the related right-of-use asset) whenever:

- The lease term has changed or there is a change in the assessment of exercise of a purchase option, in which case the lease liability is re-measured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate.
- A lease contract is modified and the lease modification is not accounted for as a separate lease, in which case the lease liability is re-measured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate.

Right of Use (ROU) Assets

The ROU assets comprise the initial measurement of the corresponding lease liability, lease payments made at or before the commencement day and any initial direct costs. They are subsequently measured at cost less subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent impairment losses, if any. Right of use assets are generally depreciated over the shorter of asset's useful life and the lease term on a straight-line basis.

(xii) Income Taxes

Income tax expense comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in the statement of profit and loss except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity or in Other Comprehensive Income (OCI).

Current Income Tax

Income tax expense is recognised in the income statement except to the extent that it relates to items recognised directly in equity or OCI, in which case the tax effect is recognised in equity or OCI. Income tax payable on profits is based on the applicable tax laws in each tax jurisdiction and is recognised as an expense in the period in which profit arises. Current tax is the expected tax payable/receivable on the taxable income or loss for the period, using tax rates enacted for the reporting period and any adjustment to tax payable/receivable in respect of previous years. Current tax assets and liabilities are offset only if, the Company has a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts; and intends either to settle on a net basis, or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Deferred Tax

Deferred tax is recognised in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purpose and the amounts for tax purposes. The measurement of deferred tax reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax liabilities are generally recognised for all taxable temporary differences and deferred tax assets are recognised, for all deductible temporary differences, to the extent it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which deductible temporary differences can be utilised. Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to be applied to the temporary differences when they reverse, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. Deferred tax assets are reviewed at each reporting date and are reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that the related tax benefit will be realised, such reductions are reversed when the probability of future taxable profits improves.

The tax effects of income tax losses, available for carry forward, are recognised as deferred tax asset, when it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which these losses can be set-off. Unrecognised deferred tax assets are re-assessed at each reporting date and are recognised to the extent that it has become probable that future taxable profits will allow the deferred tax asset to be recovered.

(xiii) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents for the purpose of cash flow statement include cash in hand, balances with the banks and demand deposits with bank with an original maturity of three months or less, and accrued interest thereon.

(xiv) Trade receivables

Trade receivables are amounts due from customers for services performed in the ordinary course of business. Trade receivables are recognised initially at the amount of consideration

that is unconditional unless they contain significant financing components, when they are recognised at fair value.

(xv) Impairment of non-Financial Assets

The Company assesses at the reporting date whether there is an indication that an asset may be impaired. If any indication exists, or when annual impairment testing for an asset is required, the Company estimates the asset's recoverable amount. An asset's recoverable amount is the higher of an assets or cash-generating unit's ("CGU") fair value less costs of disposal and its value in use. The recoverable amount is determined for an individual asset, unless the asset does not generate cash inflows that are largely independent of those from other assets or groups of assets. Where the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount, the asset is considered impaired and is written down to its recoverable amount. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset. In determining fair value less costs of disposal, recent market transactions are taken into account, if available. If no such transactions can be identified, an appropriate valuation model is used. Impairment losses are recognised in Statement of Profit and Loss.

(xvi) Provision

Provision is recognised when an enterprise has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event and it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are determined based on management estimates required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date, supplemented by experience of similar transactions. These are reviewed at the balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current management estimates. The actual outflow of resources at a future date may therefore, vary from the amount included in other provisions.

(xvii) Trade payables

Trade payables are presented as financial liabilities. They are recognised initially at their fair value, net of transaction costs, and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method where the time value of money is significant.

(xviii) Contingent liabilities and Assets

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the Company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation. The Company does not recognize a contingent liability but discloses its existence in the financial statements. Contingent assets are neither recognised nor disclosed in the financial statements.

Operating segments are reported in a manner consistent with the internal reporting provided to the chief operating decision maker (CODM) of the Company. The CODM is responsible for allocating resources and assessing performance of the operating segments of the Company.

The Company's business is to provide broking services, to its clients, in the capital markets in India. All other activities of the Company are ancillary to the main business.

(xx) Earnings per share

Basic earnings per share is calculated by dividing the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year.

Diluted earnings per share is computed using the weighted average number of equity shares and dilutive potential equity shares outstanding during the year. For the purpose of calculating diluted earnings per share, the net profit or loss for the period attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of shares outstanding during the year are adjusted for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

(xxi) Securities Lending and Borrowing

- (a) Initial margin and /or additional margin paid over and above the initial margin, for entering into contracts for equity stock which are released on final settlement / squaring – up of the underlying contracts, are disclosed under Trade Payables
- (b) On final settlement or squaring up of contracts for equity stocks, the realised profit or loss after adjusting the unrealized loss already accounted, if any, is recognised in the standalone Statement of Profit and Loss.
- (c) The Lending and Borrowing fees are recognised on Pro- rata basis over the tenure of the contract.

(xxii) Event after the reporting date

Where events occurring after the balance sheet date provide evidence of conditions that existed at the end of the reporting period, the impact of such events is adjusted within the financial statements. Otherwise, events after the balance sheet date of material size or nature are only disclosed.

Capital reserve

Securities premium reserve

Securities premium reserve is used to record the premium on issue of shares. The reserve is utilised in accordance with the provisions of Companies Act 2013.

General reserve

Under the erstwhile Companies Act 1956, general reserve was created through an annual transfer of net income at a specified percentage in accordance with applicable regulations. The purpose of these transfers was to ensure that if a dividend distribution in a given year is more than 10% of the paid up capital of the company for that year, then the total dividend distribution is less than the total distributable results for that year. Consequent to introduction of Companies Act 2013, the requirement to mandatorily transfer a specified percentage of the net profit to general reserve has been withdrawn. However, the amount previously transferred to general reserve can be utilised only in accordance with the specific requirements of Companies Act 2013.

Deemed Equity (Refer note 53)

Deemed equity relates to share options granted to eligible employees of the Company by the holding company under its employee share option plan.

Retained earnings

Retained earnings are the profits that the Company has earned till date, less any transfers to general reserve, dividends or other distributions paid to shareholders.

Reservation of shares

There are no shares reserved for issue under options and contracts/ commitments for the sale of shares or disinvestments.

During the year, the Company has not declared any interim and final dividend.

33. Discontinued operations

The Board of Directors of the Company, at its meeting held on 10th October 2025, approved the business transfer agreement of the Company's Portfolio Management Services (PMS) business as a going concern, on a slump sale basis for a lump-sum consideration, pursuant to a Business Transfer Agreement executed on 4th December 2025 with a fellow subsidiary. The said transfer has also been approved by the shareholders of the Company at the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 1st December, 2025.

The completion of the transaction is subject to receipt of requisite regulatory approvals, In this regard, the Company has received approval from the Competition Commission of India (CCI); however, the approval from the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) is awaited as at the reporting date. Based on management's assessment that the disposal of the PMS business is highly probable, the said business has been classified as a disposal group held for sale and presented as a discontinued operation in accordance with Ind AS 105 "Non-current Assets Held for Sale and Discontinued Operations".

Accordingly, the results of the PMS business have been presented separately as discontinued operations and related assets and liabilities related to the PMS business have been classified as held for sale. The figures for the previous period have been re-stated to give effect, wherever applicable, to conform to the presentation requirements of Ind AS 105.

3 Financial instruments not measured at fair value

The Company's major classes of financial assets are cash and cash equivalents, Securities for trade, Trade receivables, Loans, Investments and Other financial assets which comprise mainly of margin money with clearing member deposits and accrued revenues.

Deposits with banks are considered to have negligible risk or nil risk, as they are maintained with high rated banks/financial institutions as approved by the Board of directors.

b) Liquidity risk

The Company is contesting the demands and the management believes that its position will likely be upheld in the appellate process. No provision has been accrued in the financial statements for the demand raised. The management believes that the ultimate outcome of this proceeding will not have a material adverse effect on the Company's financial position and results of operations.

Note 3:

Bank Guarantee are being taken from banks and kept with exchanges as a margin to meet the margin obligation.

Note 4:

The Company had received a notice under section 263 of the Income Tax Act, 1961, pursuant to which the Commissioner of Income Tax (CIT) has proposed to disallow a deduction amounting to Rs. 97 lakhs. Accordingly The company has created contingent liability of Rs. 24 lakhs in Previous year. During the year, the Company received an order under Section 263 of the Income-tax Act, 1961, wherein the proposed disallowance of Rs. 97 lakhs has been decided in favor of the Company. Accordingly, the tax exposure of Rs. 24 lakhs disclosed in the previous year stands reversed and no liability subsists in respect of this matter.

Note 5:

The Company received an order under the GST Act for FY 2021-22 on 24 December 2025, issued under Section 73(9) read with Rule 142 of the CGST/BGST Act, 2017, raising a total demand of ₹ 1.76 crore. This includes interest of ₹ 64.09 lakh and a penalty of ₹ 10.62 lakh. The demand primarily relates to the alleged wrongful availment of input tax credit (ITC) through cross charges and the reversal of ITC on exempt DPC income. Based on management's assessment, the demand is incorrect and not sustainable. The requirement to mandatorily distribute ITC through the Input Service Distributor (ISD) mechanism has been made applicable only from 1 April 2025. For periods prior to this, including the relevant financial year, the law permitted distribution of ITC either through the ISD mechanism or by issuing tax invoices for support services under Section 31 of the CGST Act, 2017. Accordingly, the Company has filed an appeal before the First Appellate Authority on 23 March 2026 and has deposited ₹ 10.12 lakh as a pre-deposit. Based on the Company's assessment, the likelihood of any outflow of resources in respect of this matter is remote. Hence, no contingent liability has been recognised.

The Company has setup an income tax approved irrevocable trust fund to finance the plan liability. The trustees of the trust fund are responsible for the overall governance of the plan.

Funding arrangement and policy

The money contributed by the Company to the fund to finance the liabilities of the plan has to be invested. The trustees of the plan have outsourced the investment management of the fund to an insurance company. The insurance company in turn manages these funds as per the mandate provided to them by the trustees and the asset allocation which is within the permissible limits prescribed in the insurance regulations. Due to the restrictions in the type of investments that can be held by the fund, it is not possible to explicitly follow an asset-liability matching strategy to manage risk actively. There is no compulsion on the part of the Company to fully pre fund the liability of the Plan. The Company's philosophy is to fund the benefits based on its own liquidity and tax position as well as level of under funding of the plan. The expected contribution payable to the plan next year is Rs. 500 Lakhs (PY Rs. 500 Lakhs).

44 LEASES

46 SEGMENT REPORTING

The Company's operations predominantly related to equity, derivatives, currency and commodity broking and its related activities business and is the only operating segment of the Company. The Company provides trade execution and settlement services to the customers in retail segment. There is only one performance obligation of execution of the trade and settlement of the transaction which is satisfied at a point in time. The brokerage charged is the transaction price and is recognised as revenue on trade date basis. Related receivables are generally recovered in a period of 1 day as per the settlement cycle.

B) Income from services

Income from service consists of income from distribution of financial products and advisory income.

The Company distributes various financial products and other services to the customers on behalf of third party i.e. the Company acts as an intermediary for distribution of financial products and services. The Company executes contracts with the Principal, viz. AMC's, Mutual Funds, Banks, Insurance Companies etc. to acquire customers for its products. As a consideration, the Company earns commission income from the third parties for the distribution of their financial products. The commission is accounted net of claw back if any, due to non-fulfilment of contract by the customer with the principal. The customer obtains control of the service on the date when customer enters into a contract with principal and hence subscription or contract date is considered as the point in time when the performance obligation has been satisfied. In case of continuing services, the same are recognised over a period of time.

The Company recognizes the revenue on completion of the performance obligation either on point in time or over a period of time, as the case may be.

In case of third party financial products, transaction price is determined as per contract and mutual terms agreed between the parties. The commission is a percentage of transaction value.

The distribution fee earned from the following products contributed to a major proportion of overall fee earned from distribution of financial products in current financial year:

- i Mutual Funds
- ii Life insurance policies
- iii Portfolio management products

Selling commissions/ brokerage generated from primary market operations i.e. procuring subscriptions from investors for public offerings of companies, mutual funds etc. are recorded on determination of the amount due to the company, once the allotment of securities are completed.

Portfolio management fees : Fees are recognised when corpus is offered for investment by the customer. Fees for subscription based services are received periodically but are recognised as earned on a pro-rata basis over the term of the contract. Further, fees are charged on withdrawal of invested funds before a specified period and recognised on date of execution of withdrawals.

Interest income : Interest is earned on delayed payments from clients and amounts funded to them as well as term deposits with banks. Interest income is recognised on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding from customers or on the financial instrument and the rate applicable.

Depository Income : Income from services rendered on behalf of depository is recognised upon rendering of the services, in accordance with the terms of contract.
